UPDATES FROM THE INTERIM MAYOR'S OFFICE...

The first thing I want to mention is I'm sure we all share in expressing our love and concern for Jim Milton. I want to convey our best wishes and prayers for his speedy recovery and return to work.



Projects in the works:

- 1) The dam project is moving along. Consultants are measuring the current site and will be coming back to the City with recommendations. This should be considered Phase One. The next phase will probably involve a flood and water flow study to get a better gauge of the amount of water going through the pond and the dam. The final stage will be seeking public grant money to perform whatever remediation may be deemed necessary to complete the project.
- 2) The City is reviewing a storm drain proposal to possibly move the storm drain from where it currently empties to possibly move it farther down Nacote Creek in the direction of the bridge. Once again, we will be seeking assistance from State and Federal grant monies to move ahead with the project, if Council approves.
- 3) City Administration is working on the County Hazard Mitigation Plan. This is a project updated every 5 years whereby the City updates County and State authorities on potential natural hazard issues and our preparedness to handle such issues. This puts us in a position to receive FEMA and other aid after a natural disaster.
- 4) An ad-hoc committee continues to work on the Port School funding issue. There are no clear updates yet as School Officials are working with potential consultants to come up with recommendations.

Public safety updates:

I have three reminders for residents:

- 1) There is no parking within 50 feet of a stop sign in the State of New Jersey.
- 2) There is no on-street parking allowed on streets where there is no shoulder available to keep vehicles out of traffic flow.
- 3) Finally, please remember, we have no sidewalks in town and out of respect and concern for our fellow citizens, watch your speed limits. I know the speed limits vary in town, which makes it tricky, but the signs are all compliant with State Code (we had the County perform an audit a couple of years ago).

Finally, a very special reminder that Port Day this year will be special indeed! Besides our normal celebration of Port Republic, we will be honoring the career of Mayor Gary Giberson on that day. There will be a ceremony at the Pavilion to kick off the evenings events at 6 pm. I know you all look forward to this annual event, and I hope that this year you make a special effort to be there early to celebrate Port and most important, the distinguished career and accomplishments of Mayor Gary.

IMPORTANT WELL WATER TESTING INFORMATION

Atlantic County Division of Public Health

Many homes and businesses in Atlantic County use well water for their drinking water supply. A number of water samples each year show one or more contaminants that exceed state or federal drinking water standards.

Help is available for you and your family to decide what tests are necessary, how to interpret the results, and where to obtain assistance for treatment systems or public water supply connections, if available.

ATLANTIC COUNTY RESIDENTS USING WELL WATER FOR THEIR DRINKING WATER SUPPLY ARE STRONGLY ADVISED TO TEST THEIR WATER FOR THE FOLLOWING CONTAMINANTS:

\$30 TOTAL COLIFORM BACTERIA – These bacteria are used as an indicator that other, more harmful microbes may be present in the water. Samples that show presence of total coliform are further tested for E. coli at no additional cost.

\$20 NITRATE – An acute health hazard for infants and pregnant women, high nitrate levels are attributed to fertilizers, septic systems and animal waste.

\$20 LEAD – Lead contamination in drinking water is usually attributed to leaching of lead from solder, plumbing components and faucets.

\$30 MERCURY - From landfills, crop erosion and household products.

\$95 VOLATILE ORGANIC COMPOUNDS – A variety of solvents and fuel additives.

\$125 SEMIVOLATILE ORGANIC COMPOUNDS - Three pesticide-related chemicals.

\$90 PERCHLORATE - A chemical found in rocket propellants, munitions, fertilizers.

\$100 RADIUM – A radioactive metal that is found to be naturally occurring in the underground soil formations in parts of Southern New Jersey.

\$50 METAL SCANS – Tests for 8 different metallic substances – Aluminum, Arsenic, Cadmium, Chromium, Copper, Iron, Manganese, and Sodium. Or order any one of these for \$15.

Testing will not be done by the County for resales of existing homes, new well construction, or rental properties – for these situations, please contact the laboratories below.



WHAT'S THE PROBLEM WITH WASHING YOUR CAR?

Washing your car on a paved surface can allow the soapy wash water and other pollutants, like oil and grease, to run off into a storm drain. Most soap contains phosphates and other chemicals that, in large amounts can contaminate your drinking water, as well as kill fish, wildlife and plants. The soap, together with the dirt and oil washed from your car, flows into nearby storm drains, which flows directly into lakes, rivers and the ocean. The phosphates from the soap can cause excess algae to grow, which can be harmful to the water quality.

YOU CAN HELP!

- Take your car to a car washing facility, rather than washing it yourself. Commercial car washes treat and recycle the water.
- If you can't get to a car washing facility, wash your car on an unpaved surface and use biodegradable soap.
- Organize a Car Wash Fundraiser for a local organization.

WHY SHOULD YOU CARE ABOUT CLEAN WATER?

Stormwater pollution is one of the greatest threats to New Jersey's clean water supply. Clean water provides access to safe drinking water, places for recreation, commercial opportunities, healthy wildlife habitats, and adds beauty to our landscape. Rain washes pollution from streets, parking lots, and lawns into storm drains, then directly to our streams, rivers, lakes and oceans.

Did you know more than 60 percent of water pollution comes from things like motor oil, fertilizers, pet waste, and detergents? By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater.
