

From the Mayor's Kitchen

PUMPKIN ROLL

This recipe can also be found in the Port Republic Community Cookbook All About Fruit.



INGREDIENTS

- 3 eggs
- 2/3 c. canned pumpkin
- 3/4 c. flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 c. confectioner's sugar, plus more for dusting
- 1 c. sugar
- 1 tsp. lemon juice
- 1 tsp. ground ginger
- 2 tsp. cinnamon
- 2 (3oz.) pkg. cream cheese
- 1 stick butter, room temperature
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract



DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 350. Grease and flour a 17"x12" jelly roll pan. With an electric mixer, beat the eggs, sugar, pumpkin and lemon juice until smooth. Mix flour, ginger, salt, baking powder and cinnamon. Add the dry ingredients to the egg mixture and blend until fully combined. Spread the batter in the jellyroll pan. Bake until a cake tester inserted in the center comes out clean, about 14 minutes. Let the cake cool in the pan for 5 minutes. Invert the cake onto a wire rack. Sprinkle some of the confectioner's sugar on the towel over the cake. Roll the cake up in the towel on the long side and cool in the refrigerator thoroughly for about 45 minutes. With an electric mixer, combine the confectioner's sugar, cream cheese, butter and vanilla and beat until smooth. Carefully unroll the cooled cake and spread the cream cheese frosting on top of the cake. Gently reroll the cake up and refrigerate it until you are ready to slice and serve. Dust with confectioner's sugar just before serving.



If entering more than one boat, please complete separate registration forms for each boat. If you think your boat can make it around the course multiple times, a boat can be entered in multiple divisions. For example, one boat can be entered in the Youth division and crewed only with youth members, then again entered in the Adult division and crewed only by members 14 or older. In this example, you would complete TWO registration forms and pay the entrance fee twice. (Similarly, one person can be listed as a crew member on multiple boats. This does not incur any extra fee since the entry fee is per boat, not per person.)

(The first 10 early boat registrations will receive a T-shirt)

Entries will be accepted on-site on the day of the event. Caution! There is a maximum number of boats allowed. If you wait to register on the day of the race, there may not be a spot for you, and you may be turned away. Limited to 40 boats.

City of Port Republic Annual Cardboard Duct Tape Boat Regatta September 15, 2024

Timeline:

11:30 – Registration table opens. Boat/Competitor Check in. Entry & Release forms collect for prohibited building materials.




- 1:00 Rubber Duck Race tentative (details at event)
- 1:25 Competitor heat positions will be announced.
- **1:30** Races begin.

Official Rules: The only material to use for building your boat: cardboard and duct tape

- 1. Only cardboard or corrugated cardboard may be used.
- 2. Only duct tape may be used on the cardboard. Wax, silicone, fiberglass resins, epoxy glues, staples, nails, clamps, and screws are <u>prohibited</u>.
- 3. **Decorations** may be made of any material but cannot help in keeping the boat together or afloat.
- 4. Only oars, paddles, or wind may be used to propel the boat. Oars, paddles, and sails may be made from any material and may be homemade or store bought.
- 5. Each boat must have <u>at least</u> 2 team members in the Youth, Adult, & Multi-Age Divisions. (Singles will be allowed only for age 12 & under)
- 6. A person can register more than one boat. In other words, one person can race in multiple boats.
- 7. All participants **must bring & wear personal flotation devices** (PFDs) throughout the race. Passengers in your boat must not be enclosed above their shoulders. All passengers must be visible while the boat is in the water. During competition, crew must be IN the boat, not towing it, swimming, or allowing the life jacket to provide the floatation of the vessel.
- 8. Each team must remove their entire boat and any boat remains from the water when the race is finished. A receptacle for trash will be provided.
- 9. If a judge has reason to believe that a boat is made of prohibited materials, the team will be asked to prove otherwise.
- 10. Any boat deemed "unsafe" will not be allowed to enter the race.
- 11. Races go off in two-boat heats. All races are timed.
- 12. The course is from the beach, around the buoy and back to the beach.

Questions?

- 1. **Rain date?** There is no rain date. This is rain or shine. If the forecast is for thunderstorms, we will decide that day, minute by minute, watching the weather maps and hoping for an opening. If you want an update call Val at 609-204-1633 (texting is best)
- 2. <u>Cancellations/Refunds?</u> No refunds will be given. We have expenses to pay (lifeguards, trash dumpster rental, etc) even if the weather requires the cancellation of the event.
- 3. <u>Does the boat need to be built by the people in it?</u> No, we don't care who builds your boat, as long as it is made ONLY out of cardboard and duct tape.
- 4. **How long is the course?** You need to paddle your boat from the beach out to a buoy about 30 yards in the river, circle the buoy and return to the beach.
- 5. How do the boat heats work? After all boats have checked in, (1:00 pm) all entries will be matched up in two-boat heats. Race officials will determine which two boats are in each heat. You are racing for time, not necessarily to beat the other boat in your heat. Your boat may be matched up against a boat in a different division. (though boats in the Single division will only race against other Single boats) There will be individual timers for each boat. The Timers will report the time to the race officials who will determine the fastest times in each division.
- 6. What is the Top Dog Race? After all boats have raced in their two-boat heat, any boat/team that thinks they can make it around the course again, can race in the TOP DOG Race. In the TOP DOG race ALL boats will line up in the water and go off at the same time > all paddling like crazy to get from beach to buoy to beach again. The first boat to reach back to the beach is the winner of the TOP DOG trophy.
- 7. **Releases:** Each person in the boat must have a signed release. See next page. Make extra copies for each member in the boat. We will have copies at the registration desk if you forget.





Smoke Alarms

et Home


SMOKE ALARMS ARE A KEY PART of a home fire escape plan. When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside quickly.

SAFETY TIPS

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom. They should also be outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.
- Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.
- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms.
 When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- Test all smoke alarms at least once a month.
 Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.
- Current alarms on the market employ different types of technology including multi-sensing, which could include smoke and carbon monoxide combined.
- Today's smoke alarms will be more technologically advanced to respond to a multitude of fire conditions, yet mitigate false alarms.
- A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall. Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms. They should be at least 10 feet (3 meters) from the stove.
- People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms. These alarms have strobe lights and bed shakers.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.


FACTS

- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Smoke alarms should be installed inside every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level. Smoke alarms should be connected so when one sounds, they all sound. Most homes do not have this level of protection.
- (1) Roughly 3 out of 5 fire deaths happen in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.





Your Logo



Often called the invisible killer, carbon monoxide is an invisible, odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel can be sources of carbon monoxide.

- CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home and in other locations where required by applicable laws, codes or standards. For the best protection, interconnect all CO alarms throughout the home. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for placement and mounting height.
- Choose a CO alarm that is listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- Call your local fire department's non-emergency number to find out what number to call if the CO alarm sounds.
- Test CO alarms at least once a month; replace them according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- If the audible trouble signal sounds, check for low batteries.
 If the battery is low, replace it. If it still sounds, call the fire department.
- If the CO alarm sounds, immediately move to a fresh air location outdoors or by an open window or door. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for. Call for help from a fresh air location and stay there until emergency personnel declare that it is safe to re-enter the home.
- If you need to warm a vehicle, remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor indoors, even if garage doors are open. Make sure the exhaust pipe of a running vehicle is not covered with snow.
- During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.
- A generator should be used in a well-ventilated location outdoors away from windows, doors and vent openings.
- Gas or charcoal grills can produce CO only use outside.





Have fuel-burning heating equipment and chimneys inspected by a professional every year before cold weather sets in. When using a fireplace, open the flue for adequate ventilation. Never use your oven to heat your home.

FACTS

- (1) A person can be poisoned by a small amount of CO over a longer period of time or by a large amount of CO over a shorter amount of time.
- In 2010, U.S. fire departments responded to an estimated 80,100 non-fire CO incidents in which carbon monoxide was found, or an average of nine calls per hour.

Will the Fire Department clean my chimney for me?

No. The fire department does not provide chimney sweep services as there are too many liabilities and issues that may arise. There are licensed professionals that perform cleanings.

Chimney sweeps inspect, clean and repair residential and commercial chimneys. The traditional method of cleaning chimneys involves a two-step process in which the sweep brushes from the top of the chimney outside the building, and then finishes by sweeping and cleaning the fire box from inside the premises. There are a lot of risks that are associated with operating a chimney sweep.

Liability of a volunteer firefighter, a fire department, or a municipality depends upon all the facts and circumstances in each particular case and, therefore we refrain from actions such as this that could be determined by the courts as negligent.

Please remember when heating devices are not properly maintained, the result can be dangerous and sometimes disastrous

FIRE SAFETY TIPS

- ★ Burn dry hardwood (If possible). If your wood is wet or not fully cured, it will not burn as hot as dry wood. It will also smoke more. Burning wet wood leads to creosote building up faster in your chimney.
- * Keep combustibles away. Woodstoves should be at least three feet away from unprotected combustible materials. Keep the area around the hearth clear of debris, decorations and flammable materials.
- ★ Keep a fire extinguisher handy for every fireplace or stove.
- ★ Clean your chimney. Chimneys should be inspected and cleaned annually by a certified chimney specialist to prevent fire or carbon monoxide poisoning. Check your flue regularly for any obstructions such as squirrel or bird nests, debris, etc.
- ★ Check the draft. Before starting a fire in your fireplace or woodstove, be sure the draft is wide open. This allows proper ventilation for your fire.
- ★ Keep your fireplace and chimney in good condition. Check your chimney for cracks and loose mortar or bricks. Have any problems fixed before using your fireplace or wood stove.
- ★ Tend to your fire. Never leave a fire in your fireplace unattended. Make sure the fire is extinguished before going to bed.

If a fire starts and you have any doubt about whether or not to fight the fire - Don't!

Get out and call 9-1-1.



IMPORTANT WELL WATER TESTING INFORMATION

Atlantic County Division of Public Health

Many homes and businesses in Atlantic County use well water for their drinking water supply. A number of water samples each year show one or more contaminants that exceed state or federal drinking water standards.

Help is available for you and your family to decide what tests are necessary, how to interpret the results, and where to obtain assistance for treatment systems or public water supply connections, if available.

ATLANTIC COUNTY RESIDENTS USING WELL WATER FOR THEIR DRINKING WATER SUPPLY ARE STRONGLY ADVISED TO TEST THEIR WATER FOR THE FOLLOWING CONTAMINANTS:

\$30 TOTAL COLIFORM BACTERIA – These bacteria are used as an indicator that other, more harmful microbes may be present in the water. Samples that show presence of total coliform are further tested for E. coli at no additional cost.

\$20 NITRATE – An acute health hazard for infants and pregnant women, high nitrate levels are attributed to fertilizers, septic systems and animal waste.

\$20 LEAD – Lead contamination in drinking water is usually attributed to leaching of lead from solder, plumbing components and faucets.

\$30 MERCURY - From landfills, crop erosion and household products.

\$95 VOLATILE ORGANIC COMPOUNDS - A variety of solvents and fuel additives.

\$125 SEMIVOLATILE ORGANIC COMPOUNDS - Three pesticide-related chemicals.

\$90 PERCHLORATE - A chemical found in rocket propellants, munitions, fertilizers.

\$100 RADIUM – A radioactive metal that is found to be naturally occurring in the underground soil formations in parts of Southern New Jersey.

\$50 METAL SCANS – Tests for 8 different metallic substances – Aluminum, Arsenic, Cadmium, Chromium, Copper, Iron, Manganese, and Sodium. Or order any one of these for \$15.





Eligibility Requirements:*



and

• You owned and lived in your home or leased a site in a mobile home park for a manufactured or mobile home that you owned since December 31, 2019, or earlier;

and

• You paid all 2022 property taxes by June 1, 2023, and all 2023 property taxes by June 1, 2024;

and

- Your annual income was \$150,000* or less in 2022 and \$163,050* or less in 2023. With some exceptions, all income must be taken into account, including Social Security, pension, etc.
- * Eligibility rules, income limits, and benefits may be changed by the State Budget that will take effect on July 1, 2024.
